### **Forensic Geotechnics and Geohazards**

# Forensic Geology and International Mining, Minerals and Metals Crimes

The scope of the IUGS-IFG 'Special Project'; has been agreed to include the following (a) Precious metals, base metals and minor metals (including fraud, i.e. substitution, adulteration and theft) (b) Conflict minerals (c) Battery Minerals, (d) diamonds, gemstones (including fakes and fraud), (e) Fossil theft and fakery and (f) criminal networks, cartels and law enforcement and (g) environmental and social impacts.
